Course Description

Concepts related to shelter behavior programs; evaluation of quality of shelter behavior programs; and implementation of changes to promote shelter animal behavior and welfare.

Course Content

This course, which is intended for shelter medical and behavior staff, will focus on using a problem-oriented approach to identification, diagnosis, and treatment of behavior problems in shelter dogs and cats. Important concepts related to shelter animal behavior and welfare are explored including: behavior and welfare assessment, behavior modification and management, psychopharmacology, and behavior and welfare plan development for sheltered pets. This course builds upon the concepts taught in VME 6813 Behavioral Health for Shelter Dogs and Cats.

Course Prerequisites

1. Completion of VME 6813 Behavioral Health for Shelter Dogs and Cats
2. Requires a minimum of 6 enrolled students for the course to run.

Co-Requisites

3. Have ready access to shelter dogs or cats to work on cases.
4. Be associated with the medical or behavioral health-care teams at an animal shelter or veterinary clinic. (Course is recommended for veterinarians, veterinary technicians, behavior professionals and others who will be expected to diagnose behavioral problems and then prescribe and monitor the effects of behavior medications and treatment plans.)

Course Objectives:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Compare different types of animal shelters and the resources available to them, including shelter veterinarians, behaviorists and trainers.
2. Objectively describe canine and feline body language.
3. Accurately interpret canine and feline behaviors and motivations.
4. Assess the impact of housing and environment on behavior and welfare.
5. Discuss available methods and tools for behavior and quality-of-life assessment.
6. Determine strategies to improve individual and population behavioral health and welfare.
7. Collect and interpret behavioral data.
8. Identify underlying animal learning theory in behavioral modification techniques.
9. Select appropriate psychopharmacological interventions for shelter animal behavior problems.
10. Develop a shelter animal behavior and welfare diagnostic and treatment plan using the problem-oriented approach.
